

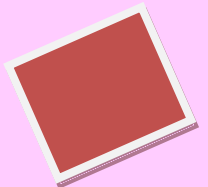
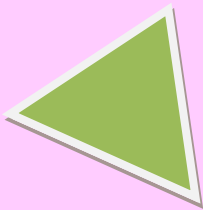
World of Shapes

Beginning as an infant, humans are attracted to patterns, designs and shapes. Geometry is everywhere. Angles, shapes, lines, curves are every single place you look around yourself. Shapes include squares, circles, rectangles, triangles, etc.
